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Willie Nelson is an

American musician, actor and activist, and one of the most recognized artists in country music. Born in 1933 during the Great Depression and raised by his grandparents, Nelson wrote his first song at age seven and joined his first band at ten.

His career took him from Texas to Arkansas, Washington State, Nashville and back to Texas, but he also spent much of his time touring. Nelson was inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1993

He wrote several of the songs we have sung, including *On the Road Again, Georgia on My Mind, Pretty Paper,* and *Crazy,* which was made famous by Patsy Cline.

In addition to his career in music, Nelson has acted in over 30 films, co-authored several books, and has been involved in activism for the use of biofuels and the legalization of marijuana.


Proper Breathing Protects Your Lungs

The way you breath affects your lungs. Your nose was designed to warm, moisten and filter the air you breath. Mouth-breathing does none of these and can create added stress to your lung tissue.

To breathe through your nose, you need clear sinuses. Dr. John Parks Trowbridge says one way is to irrigate your nasal cavity with a salt-water solution delivered by a syringe. An even better option is to use a personal humidifier with a solution of 8 ounces of water and 2 teaspoons of hydrogen peroxide, which is a powerful antimicrobial. "Breathe in the cool vapor through your nose," says Dr, Trowbridge. "The peroxide gets deposited on the surfaces of the membranes in the nose and swirls around the sinuses. It's deadly to germs and also lubricates tissue to help flush things out."

Supplements also can help, because nutrients are vital in keeping lung cells functioning at their best.

"The lungs have very fragile tissues that respond well to immune-supporting nutrients, especially vitamins A, C and D, as well as zinc and selenium," says Dr. Trowbridge. Newsmax magazine

Vaccination

Pandemics have been around forever, but starting in 1721, the smallpox epidemic taught the Western world that humans could prevent pandemic diseases. That year, the hellfire Puritan minister Cotton Mather, better known for his role in the infamous witch trials, warned of the coming epidemic already besieging England. A student of science and medicine since childhood, Mather became aware of an inoculation practice originating in Africa, called variolation. It involved taking material from patients who had smallpox and injecting it into healthy individuals. The medical community recoiled at the idea, although it proved effective in preventing the disease. In 1757, Edward Jenner, an eight-year-old boy in a small English town, underwent the procedure. When he later became a country doctor, he learned that dairies believed a livestock disease called cowpox might hold the key to preventing smallpox. In 1796, he inoculated another eight-year-old boy with material from a young woman infected with cowpox. It was the beginning of modern vaccination, a term coined from, *vacca*, the Latin word for cow.
