Why don't you go over there and try your LUCK?' So here I am. I am going to play the piano for you. I didn't know what to play, but then I came up with a great song. Oklahoma! is a song we will sing in September and also the title the first musical written by the team of composer Richard Rodgers and librettist Oscar Hammerstein II. Strangely, the musical is based on Lynn Riggs' 1931 play, *Green Grow the Lilacs*, familiar as the title of a song our chorus women sang this past March.

The original Broadway production of Oklahoma! opened on March 31, 1943. It was a box-office smash and ran for an unprecedented 2,212 performances, later enjoying award-winning revivals, national tours, foreign productions and an Academy Award-winning 1955 film adaptation.

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In September, as well as the title song, we will sing the opening song, *Oh*, *What a Beautiful Mornin'* that quickly became one of the most popular American songs to emerge from the wartime era.

Look Up with Confidence

More singers are watching the director, which helps us stay together, and we also look and sound better. You probably know more of the songs than you think you do, so don't be afraid to look up. George takes videos of our performances each month, and it's amazing to see how much better the singers look who have their heads up instead of in the book. You'll sound better too, because the sound goes out to the audience instead of down into your book.

We often make changes during practice on how we sing the music, where we repeat and other details, so it's important that you come to at least one each month. Two would be better, of course, but I know everyone is busy and can't always be there. If you do plan on singing with us in a given month, though, please make every effort to get to at least one practice so you will know how we are doing the songs. It will help us all look and sound our best.

Sunrise, Sunset, another song we will sing in September, is familiar from the musical *Fiddler on the Roof*, written in 1964 by composer Jerry Bock and lyricist Sheldon Harnick. In the show, the song is performed at the wedding of Tevye and Golde's eldest daughter. The two parents sing about how they can't believe their daughter has grown up, while Hodel and Perchik sing about whether there may be a wedding in the nearby future for them. The song has been described as "hypnotic and poignant, with infectious strains that wring the heart" by various critics. It often is played at weddings.
